

How To Control Spiders

If you afraid of spiders, you're certainly not alone. In Western societies, 55% of females and 18% of males are estimated to experience *arachnophobia*.

Besides being scary, spiders are also very messy and their webs can make even the nicest home look dirty and appear like a "haunted house".

Why is it that so many home and business owners have such a terrible time controlling spiders? One the main reasons may be that most people don't understand the basic biology and behavior of spiders. In this article, we'd like to discuss some of these basics so you can keep your home or business spider-free.

Spiders 101

There are over 35,000 described species of spiders in the world. In the U.S., we have between 400 and 700 different species that one could collect. We have three main species of spiders in Orange County that frequently invade homes and businesses:

Almost everyone knows about the black widow spider and it is probably the most feared type. The female black widow is jet-black, with a red hourglass on its underside. Males are smaller and lighter colored. A female black widow will produce 4-9 white silken egg sacs in a summer and each of those sacs contains 300-400 eggs! Add up those numbers and you'll easily understand why these pests can be so hard to control.

- Body aches are a normal reaction when a person is bitten by a black widow. Their venom may also cause headaches, high blood pressure and nausea.
- 2. The **brown widow spider** is one specie that most people had never seen until it became established in California during the early 2000's. This spider has a mottling of tan and brown with black accents and you'll find an orange colored hourglass on its underside. One of the easiest ways to identify this spider is by looking at the egg sacs. You'll see they are yellowish in color and have numerous "silk spicules". The venom of a brown widow is as toxic as the Black Widow's but their bites are minor in comparison.
- 3. The "Daddy Long Leg" spider likes to live indoors. These spiders have a small grey, elongated body with eight very long legs. 20-30 eggs are held in a silk net and this is carried with the female as she moves around. This type of spider breeds year round. Their venom is poisonous but their fangs are too short to penetrate skin and that is why they are not considered to be dangerous.

You may have heard of the **brown recluse spider.** It is one of the most feared spiders because its bite can be very painful and dangerous. <u>There are no populations of brown widow spiders living in California</u> and the odds of you getting bit by one of these spiders is realistically zero.

How You Can Control Spiders

- 1. Spiders only live in areas where there are a lot of bugs. Always start any spider control program by **eliminating the other pests,** in and around your home or business.
- 2. Knock down major cobwebs.

 This is one of the best ways to control spiders. If there aren't any webs, these spiders won't be able to catch anything and this will help encourage them to go elsewhere. This will also improve the appearance of your home.
- 3. Use a vacuum cleaner to remove spiders, their egg sacs and webs. For every egg sac you vacuum up, you could in effect be eliminating up to 400 potential new spiders!! This will also reduce the amount of insecticide needed to gain control.
- 4. **Sanitation and removal of clutter** is very important because it eliminates many places for them to live and breed.
- 5. **Keep plants cut back** and away from the exterior of your home or business. This is really important if you want to gain control over spiders. Some homes have plants, shrubs, trees and vines growing against or all over them. If this is the case, there is probably little hope that you'll ever solve your spider problem.
- 6. Boric acid or silica dust can really be effective when applied in attics, subareas, or in cracks and crevices. Remember, very little is needed and if you can see the dust after you have applied it, you have used too much.
- 7. Some residual insecticide sprays can be very useful for exterior treatments. We especially recommend using granular formulations on lawn and soil areas located adjacent to the structure because they are longer lasting. Also, they are less likely to wash away when you irrigate or if it rains.

Scientist At UC Riverside Builds A Better Ant Trap

Thanks to the great entomology department at UC Riverside, the way we control ants may be about to change for the good of all.

Kevin Welzel, a doctorial student at UC Riverside, has just published a study showing how a readily obtainable pheromone, combined with commercial ant bait, can nearly double the effectiveness of controlling Argentine ants, reducing their activity by 74 percent.

The researchers focused on Argentine ants because they are a pest that many of us have to deal with on a regular basis. Mr. Welzel stated that this invasive species represents "probably 85 percent of all pest management problems."

Test results of the new bait were even surprising to the scientist.

"I was expecting to get around 50 percent," said Welzel. "I wasn't expecting to get nearly 80 percent. It's pretty comparable to a spraying treatment. It's better for the environment and I think overall it is a better technique."

Dong-Hwan Choe, an assistant professor of entomology at the university said, "Even though the pheromone increased the consumption of the bait, we really didn't know how it would turn out. We were kind of pleased by seeing at least a 70 percent reduction where we put the pheromone bait. Achieving 70 percent or higher in the field is actually pretty

significant."

Welzel says that the addition of the pheromone is relatively economical and estimates that it would only add about \$1.50 to the cost of a month's treatment.

"Hopefully this will get out there," he said of the treated bait, "because it's a more environmentally friendly way to control them."

Study Confirms That Mountain Lions Are Eating A Large Number Of Pets

If you live near a wilderness area and have lost a pet recently, chances are it was an easy meal for a mountain lion

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) recently completed a study of 107 mountain lions that were legally killed last year. 83 of those animals had their stomach contents analyzed. The results showed that 52 percent were found to have eaten cats, dogs or other domestic animals. Only 5 percent had eaten deer, which experts will tell you are their favorite food.

Of the other lions, 16 percent were not studied, 9 percent had an empty stomach and 18 percent had contents that were too digested to be identified.

Pets may have also accounted for a good share of that 18 percent. If you consider that fact, it could mean that more than 60 percent of the lions ate cats, dogs and other domestic animals.

The DFW's study has not been released to the public as of yet. Their information officer, Andrew Hughan said, "As a pet owner you have a responsibility for the safety of that animal, especially if you live in an open space or wild habitat. When out walking, keep it on a leash or keep a very close eye, look around, above

and behind you for wild animals."

Hughan said that the problems of predators, including coyotes, eating domestic animals is so widespread that the DFW is holding numerous public meetings about the issue.

Termites Eat Up The Temple's Offerings!

It took some time, but termites managed to eat up over 200,000 rupees from a temple's offering box.

The offering box had not been opened for four years, due to a running feud between the temple's old and new management committees.

Once the disputes were settled, the new temple's management team decided to open the offering box and count the cash. Team members were surprised to find that "money hungry" termites had devoured it all.

The Indian temple is located in the Tatma Toli locality in Bihar's Purnia district, which is about 220 miles east of Patna.

"On an average, 50,000 rupees are donated to the temple every year. That means that Indian currency notes worth around 200,000 rupees have been eaten," temple founder and committee's vice-president Rohit Yadav told the media.

Mr. Yadav has asked the local district administration to handle the matter and initiate action against the guilty officials. He went on to say, "This is indeed a very serious matter, as more than spoiling money, this is a cruel joke with the sentiments of the innocent devotees."

Is Your Salad Going To Kill You?

You want to do the right thing and start eating more salads. So, you go to the market and buy a bag of triple washed, prepackaged greens. These are so convenient to use – all you have to do is rip open the bag and dump it into your salad bowl. But, you've got to ask yourself, "Is your salad going to kill you?"

The latest food-borne illness outbreak related to packaged greens began last summer. The Centers of Disease Control reports that 18 people have now been hospitalized and one person has died because their salad was contaminated with *Listeria monocytogenes*. The products linked to this most recent outbreak were produced in Springfield, Ohio, and have since been recalled.

The packages say that the contents have been triple washed; How could this happen? "Listeria is a natural soil inhabitant, and spinach commonly comes in contact with the soil," says Jeri Barak, associate professor of plant pathology at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. "Listeria, like Salmonella and E. coli, can't be rinsed or washed from the leaves even if the dirt is."

One of the reasons why repackaged greens are a greater risk for contamination is because most of them contain younger leaves or micro greens. "Data suggests that bacteria can enter wounds, such as a harvesting cut, and travel some distance into a leaf. But fresh produce that's harvested as a head has longer leaves and is more mature," she says. "A consumer has the opportunity to remove part of the head away from the harvest cut and eat leaves in which a pathogen did not reside in the harvest wound."

Food for thought; It may be the time for all of us to start buying mature, unpackaged produce and rinsing the leaves thoroughly, ourselves.
